

- 1 The blank sloping part, foot or head, of the shoulder of a type not occupied by the face of the letter.
- A unit of measurement that is one twelfth of a pica,
- Thin metal furniture.
- 11 Small wedges of various sizes, usually of wood (or metal) used for tightening or locking up formes.
- The distance between adjacent lines of type.
- **14** A material manufactured in thin sheets from the pulp of wood or other fibrous substances.
- A size of type one size larger than Brilliant (and one size smaller than a Diamond).
- An instrument for writing or drawing with ink. May contain a nib, roller ball.
- **20** In letterpress, printing without ink that results in impression.
- The first of this type of press created in 1909 and was nicknamed "the Rocker".
- A press that has a distinctive pale green paint color.
- The dot above the letter i or j.
- A paragraph-opening line that appears by itself at the bottom of a page or column.
- Lines or lines that indicating cutting.
- **29** a unit of type size and line length equal to 12 points.
- A Showcard and Vandercook has one.
- An item than is used to open and close quoins.

- **2** Wooden or metal blocks for mounting stereo and other plates.
- An arranged composition set-up in a press.
- A colored fluid used for writing, drawing, printing, or duplicating.
- This line of press included the "Ideal" model and "No. 5".
- A collection of 24 (or 25) sheets of paper of the same size and quality.
- This company makes Windmill presses.
- 10 A symbol or other design adopted by an organization to identify its products, uniform, vehicles, etc.
- Printed image in which the ink extends off or past the edge of the sheet.
- A Heidelberg Windmill is this type of press.
- The light spectrum.
- Shims of wood used to lock up a forme.
- To secure a forme or composition in a chase.
- The table or "coffin" of a machine or press upon which the forme lies.
- A small magnifying glass.
- Pieces of type metal lower than the raised typeface, used for filling spaces and blank lines.

- Paper in parcels of a certain size. Can be either 516, 472, 480, or 500 sheets.
